Can you dig it?

While we were all pleased with the food, fellowship, and funds associated with the ham dinner, not everything was good news! After Dale and Lucy spotted a backup of water in kitchen the morning of the dinner, it was discovered that our septic tank was full, and the leach field was not draining. The restrooms served by the system were closed and remain closed. After many phone calls and consultations with plumbing concerns by John, it was determined that we need a new septic system. This will be an expensive undertaking. Perhaps as much as \$50,000. Bids for estimates for a new tank, leach field, and grease traps for the kitchen are progressing. We will keep you informed as information becomes available.

A Mission to Haiti

More than 30 men and women gathered in the fellowship hall at First Baptist to complete all the steps needed to produce 160 birthing bags for Haiti. We cut out fabric, surged the edges, sewed, stuffed, threaded drawstrings, and packed the bags to get ready to ship to Haiti to assist rural women in safe home births. The handmade bags contained sterile pads, gloves, antibacterial gel, lengths of string, alcohol wipes, as well as an outfit for a newborn and receiving blanket for Mom. The fellowship hall was lined with tables with sewing machines, cutting tables, and tables to fill baggies with supplies. The hall outside of the room was the assembly line for filling the completed bags. As the participants worked, they made new friends, talked, laughed, and enjoyed the day of service.
