# Do This in Remembrance of Me - Maundy Thursday

On March 28, 15 members gathered around the large round table to partake in the Lord's supper, a portion of the Passover celebration. Jesus introduced His disciple to the bread – symbolic of the body of Christ and the wine – symbolic of His blood shed for the remission of our sins. Pastor Paul explained the meaning of the word "maundy", that it comes from the Latin word mandatum, or commandment, reflecting Jesus' words "I give you a new commandment.

<sup>14</sup> And when the hour came, he reclined at table, and the apostles with him. <sup>15</sup> And he said to them, "I have earnestly desired to eat this Passover with you before I suffer. <sup>16</sup> For I tell you I will not eat it<sup>[b]</sup> until it is fulfilled in the kingdom of God." <sup>17</sup> And he took a cup, and when he had given thanks he said, "Take this, and divide it among yourselves. <sup>18</sup> For I tell you that from now on I will not drink of the fruit of the vine until the kingdom of God comes." <sup>19</sup> And he took bread, and when he had given thanks, he broke it and gave it to them, saying, "This is my body, which is given for you. Do this in remembrance of me."<sup>20</sup> And likewise the cup after they had eaten, saying, "This cup that is poured out for you is the new covenant in my blood. Luke 22: 14-20

We passed the bread around the table and then the wine, where we dipped the bread into the chalice. We ate and drank together then ended with a prayer. Peace be with you.

### The Walk

#### An interactive experience of the way of the cross

On Good Friday at noon members of the East Aurora Churches Together hosted "The Walk" at St. Matthias' Episcopal Church on Main Street, East Aurora. The Walk was an interactive journey through the way of the cross. Members from six congregations were welcomed into the sanctuary with a smile and a guide for the journey. We moved through the fourteen stations of the cross as we pondered what Jesus and those around him experienced walking the "Way of Sorrow". Not only did you hear the stories about the journey, but also there were tangible things to experience along the way. All types of music filled to air to heighten the experience. Everything culminated at the cross, lay your burdens down, give praise, and thanksgiving.



This year at First Baptist we have a Good Friday Service. The evening started with an orchestra led by Ivan Docenko, played the Seven Last Words of Christ prelude.



Pastor Paul welcomed everyone and began the readings with an intro.

The Gospels record that during the six hours Jesus was hanging on the cross He made seven different statements. These statements are of tremendous significance because they are the last words of Jesus before His death. They demonstrate that Jesus was consistent in His life and in His message until the end.

Then the seven last sayings of Christ were read, interludes in between the music. The seven last saying were:

- "Father, forgive them, for they know not what they do"
- "Today you will be with me in Paradise"
- "Woman, behold your Son"
- "My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?"
- " I thirst "
- "It is finished"

"Father, into your hands I commend my spirit"

The seven statements Jesus made from the cross have far-reaching significance for us today. They once again remind us that His death, besides being a fact of history, was much more than that. It was the supreme sacrifice that secured our salvation. His final words show us that we can have the utmost confidence in Him as our Savior.

#### **Sonrise Service**

We gathered in the parking the lot by the large wooden cross to welcome our risen Savior. Heather played *Amazing Grace* on her trumpet. Pastor Paul reminded us of the three hopes, *No Hope, Cautionary Hope, and Hope (and Grace and Love)*. Though the sun was not shining our heart were filled with light. He has risen indeed!

After service we gathered inside to partake of a small fellowship. We left with joy in our hearts.
