

#### World Day of Prayer

Kia orana (Key-ah-o-raah-nah) May you live long. May you live well. May you shine like the sun. May you dance with the waves – a Maori greeting from the Cook Islands

World Day of Prayer Service is a women led, global, ecumenical movement that takes place the first Friday in March every year. This year it was held at Baker Church. The women led us through the service which focused on the Cook Islands. The theme was Psalm 139 1-18, Fearfully and Wonderfully Made. We learned about the people of the Cook Islands and heard stories about women who were strengthen by the Psalm. Marge Lowry read the scriptures and various women shared stories of three women from the Cook Island with the themes, God Knows Us, God is with Us, and God Made Us Wonderful. The congregation was invited to take a sea shell, put it in a vase and shared who was on their heart. The congregation responded by saying "God Made Us Wonderful". It was very moving and heartfelt. The church altar and surrounding area was filled mementos of cloths, flowers, tropical hats, boats and sea shells. And the reception after the service featured food that represented the Cook Islands. Our offering totaled \$361 and there were 49 people in attendance. Women from Baker Memorial United Methodist Church, First Baptist Church of East Aurora, St Matthias Episcopal Church and St Nicodemus Lutheran Church participated in the planning and served. Next year, Elma United Methodist Church will be the host church. We hope you will attend next year.

#### **Help for Haiti Continues**

While setting up for the March birthing bag sewing event, a group of us looked at the supplies on hand and thought there was no way all those hats, onsies, pads, and blankets would be used. Were we wrong! The group of volunteers who came on the 6<sup>th</sup> worked steadily and utilizes all those supplies to fabricate and fill hundreds of clean delivery bags for the women of rural Haiti.

Sewing machines buzzed, scissors blades clicked, baggies zipped, and strings strung. There was something for everyone present to do. We took a break for a healthy salad bar lunch and then went right back to work! At the end of the day Sue Allen and crew had filled more than a dozen large shipping boxes to send to Haiti. Well done, Volunteers! The next workday for Helping Hands 4 Haiti is Thursday, May 8, 9 AM-2PM. We will be making simple dresses, skirts, and fabric toys. Bring your own lunch. Coffee and beverages will be provided. All are welcome.

#### **Souper Bowl Sunday**

We delivered eight boxes and bags to FISH the week after our annual Souper Bowl Sunday (without the Bills in the Super Bowl). In those bags and boxes were cans and boxes of soup, vegetables, broth, noodles, rice, crackers, cereal, applesauce, and more. In addition, cash donations totaled \$145.00. That's quite a few meals for some of our needy neighbors. Thank you.

Every week we take two or three bags of donated groceries to the FISH building. FISH puts out a list of suggested items for each church in the area for each month of the year. That helps them fill their shelves without having to purchase items to restock popular foods. Our suggested food items are listed in the LINK each month: March is tuna, and April is soup. Of course, anything is acceptable. Wouldn't it be great if we could fill five or six bags every week?

#### Pastor's Thoughts

<sup>18</sup> And Jesus came and said to them, "All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me. <sup>19</sup> Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, <sup>20</sup> teaching them to observe all that I have commanded you. And behold, I am with you always, to the end of the age." (Matthew 28:18-20)

From the time of Moses, written laws have guided God's people, providing structure and direction. The Ten Commandments, inscribed on stone, laid the foundation for moral living. Yet, even as the Law was given, God's desire was never just for outward compliance but for inward transformation. He has always longed for His people to live out truth, not merely follow written instructions. When Jesus walked the earth, He confronted a culture that had elevated the letter of the law above its spirit. The Pharisees meticulously obeyed every command but often lacked love, mercy, and true righteousness. Jesus rebuked them, saying, "You search the Scriptures because you think that in them you

have eternal life; and it is they that bear wit-

ness about me" (John 5:39). His point was clear: knowing the words wasn't enough—

truth had to be lived.

Living truth means embodying God's principles in our daily lives. It means loving God and loving others, not because we are commanded to, but because our hearts are transformed by His love. Paul captures this idea when he writes, "You yourselves are our letter, written on our hearts, known and read by everyone" (2 Corinthians 3:2). We are not meant to be walking rulebooks but living testimonies of God's grace.

There's all the difference in the world between describing what it means to ride a bicycle and actually helping somebody get on the seat and pedal away. Making a cake seems to be fairly straightforward when I look at the recipe books, but I haven't had much success in making one that actually tastes right! What I need is hands-on guidance: somebody to do it in front of me and then allow me to try my hand at it too. This doesn't mean we discard Scripture. The Bible remains our foundation, but it is not meant to be a checklist; it is a guide that leads us into a deeper relationship with God. As we grow in faith, the written word becomes a living reality in us. We don't just read about kindness—we practice it. We don't just study forgiveness—we extend it. We don't just learn about God's love—we reflect it.

Jesus Himself is the ultimate example of living truth. He didn't just preach about God's love—He embodied it through His actions, His sacrifice, and His compassion. He *is "the Word made flesh"* (John 1:14), showing us that God's truth isn't meant to stay on the page; it is meant to be lived out in everyday life.

As followers of Christ, Easter reminds us that we are called to go beyond written instructions and live the truth in a way that draws others to Him. When people see us, may they not only hear words of faith but witness lives transformed by the power of the risen Christ.

#### What is EPP?

EPP is English Paper Piecing. It is a traditional hand-sewing technique where fabric pieces are wrapped around paper shapes, secured, and then sewn together to create intricate designs, with the paper removed once the shapes are joined.

#### Why do I need to know this?

Well, a group of 8-10 women meet on the third Wednesday

of the month from 5:00 – 7:00 pm in the parlor. We gather to work on projects, share sewing techniques, and show our WIPs (work in progress) and completed projects. We are grateful to
